PERSONNEL SUMMARY

We currently have eight full-time officers, six part-time officers and one full-time administrative assistant on the department. We are in the process of hiring another full-time officer due to a vacancy created when a probationary officer resigned. Nine full-time officers continue to be our authorized strength, which is outlined in our current Strategic Plan.

Three new part-time officers were hired this year to help fill open shifts created from the resignation of a full-time officer and to fill a vacant patrol position due to Sergeant Steinhauer's on duty leg injury.

Sergeant Steinhauer will hopefully be returning to active duty in January 2007.

This past year the internship program was expanded and two interns worked for our department during the summer months. The interns helped with office work, traffic details, performed foot / bike patrols and rode with the officers. This program continues to work very well and we actually hired two part-time officers that have worked as interns during the previous summer. This program has received several positive comments from community members.

Officer Ryan Enlow left the department to work full-time with Grand Haven Department of Public Safety.

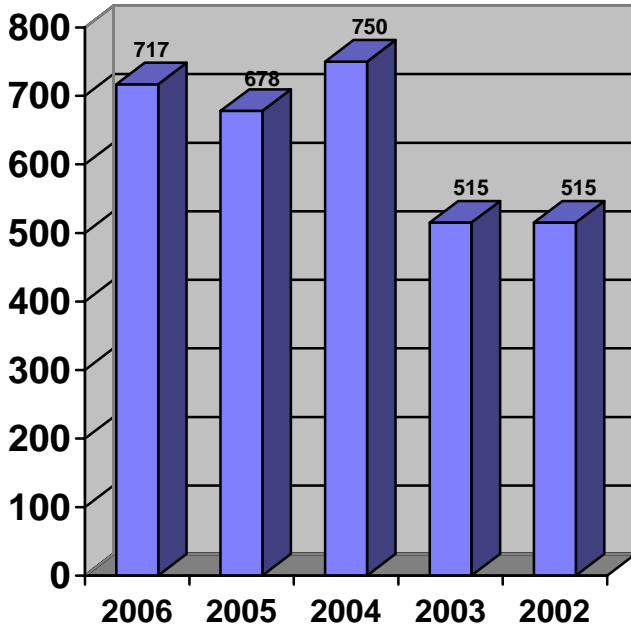
In 2006, the department purchased a 2007 Ford Crown Victoria to replace the 2005 Ford Crown Victoria. The 2007 Ford Crown Victoria is black in color with new overhead lights and different graphics. The 2007 Ford Crown Victoria is designated as car number 4722 and used mainly in Ferrysburg for taking calls for service and traffic enforcement. The new stealth look has received several positive comments from the community and other police agencies in our area. The 2005 Crown Victoria is being designated as car number 4721 which is used by the officers taking calls in Spring Lake. The other 2005 Ford Crown Victoria is our new spare patrol car which is designated as car number 4723. The 2004 Ford Crown Victoria was sold for \$4,200.00.

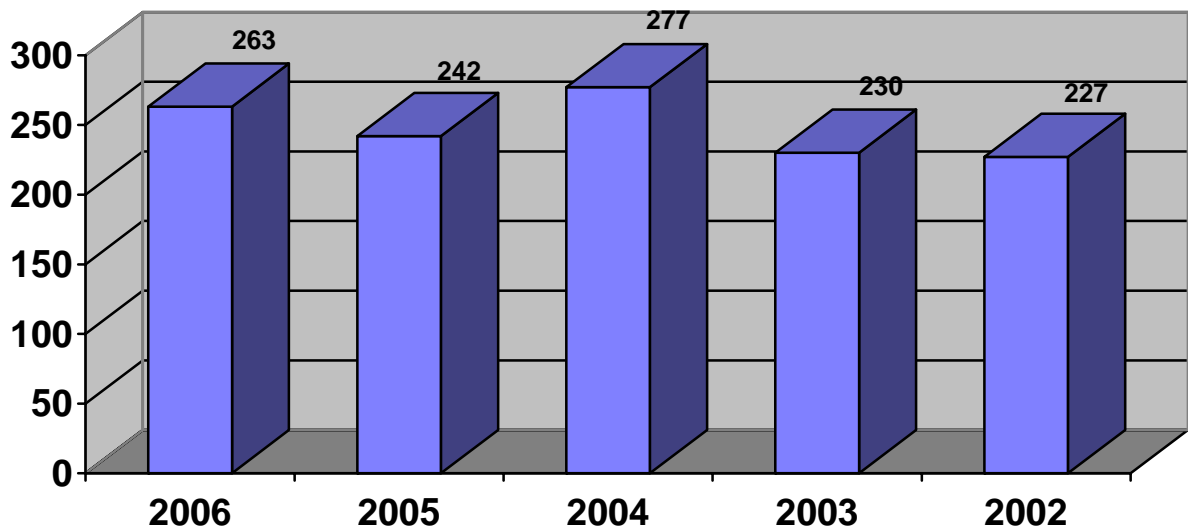

CRIMINAL SUMMARY

Part I Crime, is up in both communities slightly, (93) in Spring Lake compared to (92) last year and (55) in Ferrysburg compared to (41) last year. Part II Crime, was up in Spring Lake (310) compared to (257) last year but down in Ferrysburg, (259) compared to (288) in 2005. Total Crime in 2006 was up (717) compared to (678) in 2005.

Part I Crime, which is the more serious, was up in Ferrysburg, mainly due to (11) more larcenies being reported. The most common larcenies were fail to pays from gas stations and thefts from motor vehicles.

Part II Crime, increased in Spring Lake but decreased in Ferrysburg. The biggest increases were in vandalisms, narcotic law violations, liquor law violations, disorderly conducts, and the all other category.

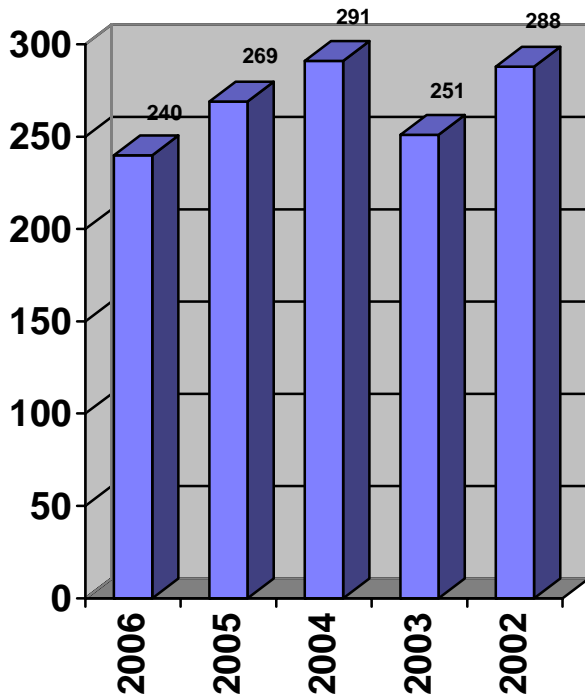
We had another fortunate year with no reports of murders and only three rapes. The rapes were committed by known associates and were solved.

The solution rate for Part I Crime increased again to 57% in 2006 from 56% in 2005. The National average in 2005 for Part I Crime was 33%. The total crime cleared was an astonishing 84% in 2006.

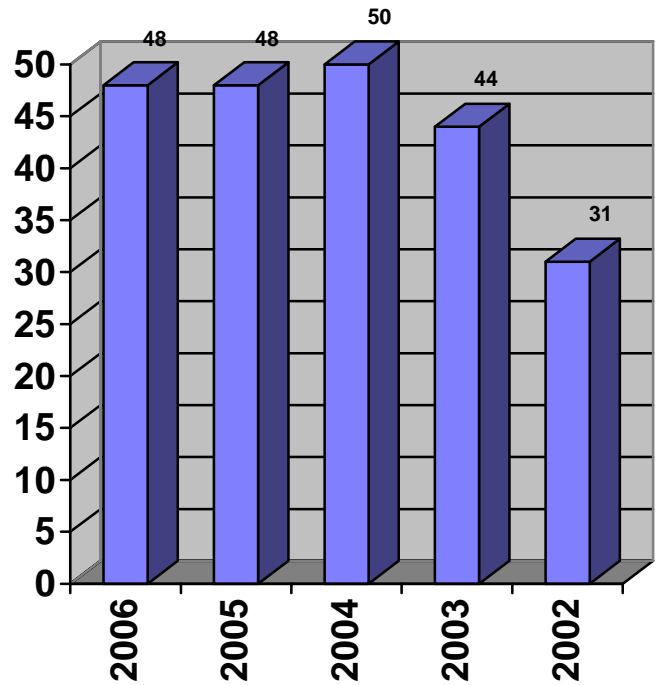

TRAFFIC SUMMARY

The number of accidents in Spring Lake was up from (123) in 2005 to (127) in 2006. Ferrysburg was down from (146) in 2005 to (113) in 2006. One fatal accident was reported in Spring Lake due to a bicyclist being struck by a vehicle. Alcohol related and personal injury accidents were up slightly in 2006.

The department made 144 traffic arrests, which includes driving on suspended or revoked licenses, no insurance and no operator's license ever applied.

Traffic citations issued went up from (1,733) in 2005 to (1,941) in 2006. The officer's also gave out (1,515) verbal warnings for traffic violations. Speeding citations were up in both communities.

Operating While Intoxicated (O.W.I.) arrests went down in Spring Lake but up in Ferrysburg. Parking citations were also up in both communities by almost 50%.

TRAINING SUMMARY

Officer safety and training are integral components of the police department, since an ill-trained department may reduce the competency level of the department and thereby threatens public safety, training is essential. The department's training program comprises of core, update, and specialized training.

Sergeant Steinhauer who is the department's training coordinator has had another busy year and provided the department with 1,103 hours of various training classes. This is 200 hours down from the previous year. We have been utilizing the West Michigan Training Consortium for most of our training courses. This concept proves to be a big savings for the department because the training is held locally and departments do not have added hotel and food cost.

The department's goal is to have officers trained within this department as instructors in order to provide in service trainings which are proven to be the most cost effective way to train. During this past year Officer Turbett was trained as an instructor for our patrol rifles and Detective Theune and Officer Allard were trained as Laser (radar) instructors. These officers will then train our department's staff.

Training Highlights: Glock/Remington Armorer Schools, Patrol Rifle Instructor School, and Statement Analysis.

CONCLUSION

This past year was another exceptional year in terms of minimal serious crime and clearance rates. Even though the number of calls for service continues to increase the overall solvability rate was 84 %. This is the advantage of having a full-time detective on staff. Our calls for service this past year numbered (4, 576), which averages to 12.5 calls per day.

The School Liaison Officer's position continues on a limited but adequate basis for our two communities. This position continues to be maintained by the department's detective. Detective Theune makes himself available to the community schools when assistance is needed.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the following for their continued support, dedication and assistance; The Police Commission, both Managers, both Councils and especially all the employees of the Village of Spring Lake/ City of Ferrysburg Police Department who continue to do their very best in serving the residents and visitors of the Village of Spring Lake and the City of Ferrysburg.

PART I AND PART II DEFINITIONS

Part I

Murder: To Kill another human being unlawfully

Rape: Forcing another person to submit to sexual acts against that persons will.

Robbery: Unlawfully taking the property of another by the use of force or intimidation.

Aggravated Assault: A violent physical attack that causes injury requiring medical attention.

Burglary: Entering a building or other premise with the intent to commit a theft.

Larceny: Unlawful taking of another's personal property with the intent to permanently deprive them of that property.

Motor Vehicle Theft: Unlawfully taking a motorized vehicle away from another with the intent to permanently deprive them of that property.

Arson: Maliciously, voluntarily, and willfully setting fire to a building or other property of another.

Part II

Negligent Manslaughter: The unlawful killing of one human being by another without express or implied intent to do injury.

Assault: A violent physical or verbal attack.

Forgery/Counterfeiting: A criminal falsification by making or altering an instrument with the intent to defraud.

Fraud: A deception deliberately practiced in order to secure an unfair or unlawful gain.

Embezzlement: The illegal taking by an offender of money or other valuable thing entrusted in their care.

Stolen Property: Buying, receiving, selling, concealing, or possessing any property of another with knowing that it is has been criminally taken.

Vandalism: Willful or malicious destruction of public or private property.

Weapons Offense: The violation of laws prohibiting the use of firearms, knives, explosives or other deadly weapons.

Prostitution & Vice: To unlawfully engage in sexual relations for profit.

Sex Offenses: Unlawful, non-forcible sexual penetration, illegal acts done for sexual stimulation or gratification or involving display or exposure of sexual organs.

Narcotics: Violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, possession or use of certain controlled substances.

Gambling: To unlawfully stake money or other valuables on the happening of an uncertain event.

Family and Children: Unlawful, non-violent acts by a family member, which threatens the unity of the family.

Liquor Laws: Violations of liquor laws or ordinances.

Disorderly Conduct: Offenses which agitate against or which disturbs the peace or tranquility of the community in general.

All Other: Criminal offenses, which do not qualify for any of the proceeding, file class codes. Examples: Dog law violations, trespassing, littering and all other ordinances.
